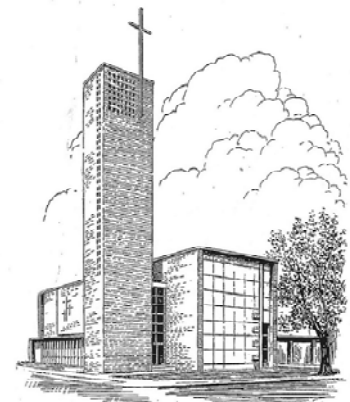
### Summer Preschool

## Seward Longfellow Restorative Justice Partnership

A mother is shopping at the Lake Street Target store. Her son has recently been arrested at the store for shoplifting. Down one of the aisles she sees the head of security. What does she do? She walks up to him, greets him warmly and thanks him, then fills him in on how her son is doing. They part ways with smiles and go about their days. Why so friendly? The Lake Street Target participates in the Seward Longfellow Restorative Justice Partnership.

What is *restorative justice*? When we think of criminal justice, we tend to think of what's called *retributive justice*, which focuses on assigning penalties for wrongdoing. A crime is committed. A law is broken. The system must establish guilt and assign a punishment. The crime creates a "debt" and the debt must be repaid.

Restorative justice takes a different approach. First and foremost, it sees a crime as a rupture in a web of relationships. A crime harms many people. In the case of a home burglary, the homeowner is harmed, but so, too, are the neighbors, whose sense of security diminishes. Police officers must forcibly detain another human being and divert his or her life in profound ways. The arrest disrupts the lives of the burglar's family. Restorative justice tries to take into account this complex web of relationships and all the people involved. It asks, "How can these relationships be restored? How can the harm be made right?"

The Seward Longfellow Restorative Justice Partnership (SLRJP) began working in the 55406 zip code area in 2004, initiated by a Longfellow resident who was inspired by an educational event at her church. Participation is voluntary. Focusing on juveniles who have committed low level offenses, SLRJP brings together the people affected by the crime to meet with the young person who committed it. An SLRJP facilitator oversees a process whereby each individual explains the impact that the event has had on him or her. The group then decides what steps are taken next.

The group might decide to have the young person pay back money taken, write an apology, attend tutoring, join a sports team, or undertake a mutual project with the victim. In one case, the owner of a local hardware store had the young man come in and learn about the hardware business. Eventually he was hired at the store—a fine example of what we in the church might call *reconciliation*.

Here are some of the advantages of a restorative approach:

- It diverts cases from the overloaded court system and handles them for about one-fourth of the cost. Rather than perhaps 30 seconds in front of a judge, a young person gets an hour and a half of conversation with people invested in his or her situation.
- It allows deeper issues to surface, such as problems at home or in school.
- It keeps a young person from acquiring a criminal record, which can interfere with job and education prospects.
- It offers a second chance.
- The young person can hear from others about the effect of his or her actions.

Because our mission is a "ministry of reconciliation" (2 Cor. 5), Christ Church Lutheran supports the Seward Longfellow Restorative Justice Partnership.
